## Two Ways to Measure Crime

Every year The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) creates a survey that reports what type of crimes were committed in every city, county, and state as well as the information about the people who were arrested for those crimes, the victims of the crime, and the weapons that may have been used to commit the crime, in addition to other data. This survey is called the Universal Crime Report (UCR). It divides crime into two categories: Part I offenses (index crimes) and Part II offenses. Part I offenses are more serious crimes than Part II offenses.

Another method of collecting information about crime is through a national self-report survey called *The National Crime Victimization Survey* (NCVS). The Bureau of Census together with the Bureau of Justice Statistics sends out this survey to about 50,000 people every year and asks them questions about any crimes that were committed against them.
