Choosing the right verb in conditional sentences

- When **if** is used to introduce a dependent clause, the sentence is called a conditional sentence. **Unreal conditional sentences** express unreal or imaginary situations, while **future possible conditionals** are used to predict what will happen in the future under certain circumstances.
- In unreal conditionals, the verb in the dependent clause (*if*-clause) is in the past tense, and in the independent clause (result clause) *would + the base* form of the verb is used.
 - Example: *If I **had** a million dollars, I **would donate** a portion of it to my university.*
- In the unreal conditional, *were* is used in the **if-clause** even with *I, he, she* and *it*.
 - Example: *If I **were** president, I **would support** universal health care.*
- In future possible conditionals, the verb in the **if-clause** is in the present tense, and the verb in the **result clause** is in the future tense.
 - Example: *If I **have** time after finishing my homework tonight, I **will call** you.*
