## 40. Word Order

Look at the order of the different parts of these sentences.

| Doctors | diagnose | patient's illnesses. |
| :--- | :--- | :--- |
| Nurses | are | responsible for taking care of patients. |
| Patients | complain | frequently. |
| They | complain | about the service in the hospital. |

Notice that all these sentences follow the same order.

| Subject | Verb | Complement (what comes after the verb) |
| :--- | :--- | :--- |

Most sentences in English follow this Subject - Verb - Complement order.
If you follow this basic order when you write a sentence, your writing will be clearer.

## There are a few exceptions to this basic order of sentences:

1. Questions

| Helping Verb | Subject | Main Verb | Complement |
| :--- | :--- | :--- | :--- |
| Do | hospitals | have | adequate sanitary conditions? |
| Are | hospitals |  | safe? |
| Have | hospitals | improved | infection control procedures? |

2. Requests/Commands

| Subject (implied but not said) | Verb | Complement |
| :--- | :--- | :--- |
| (you) | Turn | the light on please. |
| (you) | Hand | in your assignment on time. |

3. Sentences with There is/There are *

| There | BE Verb | Subject | Complement |
| :--- | :--- | :--- | :--- |
| There | is | a problem | that need to be solved. |
| There | are | problems | that need to be solved. |

* Notice that in a sentence starting with There is/There are, There is not the subject. The subject comes after the verb. Make sure that the subject and the verb agree.

Common errors with word order

| Error | Incorrect | Correct |
| :--- | :--- | :--- |
| Missing subject | $\underline{\text { Is an important problem. }}$ | $\underline{\text { It is an important problem. }}$ |
| Missing There | In the country are many <br> problems. | In the country, there are many <br> problems. |
| Question word order <br> used in a statement | The scientists do not know why is <br> the disease spreading. | The scientists do not know why <br> the disease is spreading. |
